A Ladder to Heaven

Synopsis

Many years ago, there was a mountain village here. The monks were mowing grass on the monastery roof. The wind was playing with the seeds, tossing them under the wrecked roofing and in some rainy years nettle, poppy seeds, and oat grew right through the roof.

Now the village is deserted, some violent act of nature must have happened and people have abandoned these places. Now this is a secluded land, only stones remain here. The merchant stops his caravan in the meadow and looks around. Not a soul in sight. A little while later he finds an old woman who sits on her hunkers by the fire where the kettle is boiling.

She works her hand free out of her shawl – she wears a silver bracelet with chainlets. He wishes to buy it – it seems like a good deal. It means he didn't just waste four days getting here through the rocky mountain road in the burning heat in vain.

The merchant demonstrates clothes, necklaces, odds and ends. He offers the old woman money. He lays out the stamps. The old woman picks up the stamp with a bird on it, she searches in the drapes of her skirt and takes out scissors. She cuts out a bird and places it on her palm – as if she believed the bird would fly away.

And indeed, the wind picks up the paper bird, the old woman laughs, claps her hands, looks at her bird flying in the sky next to real birds who were scared off the pond by the noise. The old woman draws a stairway on the ground. She motions to the merchant, showing him that she wishes to get the wood that one of the mules carries. The merchant refuses – that's expensive Lebanon cedar, that's not a good deal.


The angry merchant wanders around the village and stumbles upon an old cemetery. There is a wooden ladder next to every grave — the ladders must have been used to carry down the deceased into the graves.

And then the ladders were just left so that souls could easily come up to heaven.

The merchant makes up a bed in one of the abandoned houses. In the night, he dreams about stairways with deceased villagers sitting on top of each. There is one more grave dug out in the ground, but there is no ladder next to it.

The next morning the merchant crafts a stairway for the old woman and stays in the village.








Producer



Maria Zeid (Ivanova) is a producer and director. CEO of Buta Films production company (www.butafilms.ru, new name - Scoop Production) and organizer of international cultural events. One of her significant works - short film "Sonuncu" ("The Last One") which she produced, premiered in the Official Competition of the 67th Cannes Film Festival, participated in 87 international film festivals and received 9 awards. In 2016 Maria conceived and organized the first Russian film festival in Lebanon and started to actively collaborate with Middle Eastern region. 

Olga Artemyeva






